

JD Certificate in Health Law

The JD Certificate in Health Law offers degree candidates competitive specialization in health law. The certificate curriculum consists of foundational, required courses in administrative law, health and health fraud law, and medical negligence. JD candidates will further distinguish their specialization by taking electives in a broad range of interdisciplinary areas. Certificate Requirements

Certificate candidates must complete a minimum of 19 credits in the health law curriculum to earn the JD Certificate in Health Law. Candidates must earn 9 required credits and 10 elective credits (see below). Candidates must maintain a 3.25 grade point average in all courses that count toward the certificate and a 3.0 grade point average overall.
