The John Marshall Law School is seeking applicants for the position of a One-Year Clinical Attorney Fellowship for The John Marshall Law School Fair Housing Legal Clinic beginning on November 1, 2010.

About The John Marshall Law School

The John Marshall Law School, for more than 100 years, has been a pioneer in legal education. Throughout its history, The John Marshall Law School has upheld a tradition of diversity, innovation and opportunity, and has consistently provided an education that combines an understanding of the theory, the philosophy, and the practice of law. The John Marshall Law School was among the first law schools in Chicago to admit female students and to enroll African-American students, offer non-traditional (conditional) admission, and offer evening courses for practicing attorneys. Founded in 1899, The John Marshall Law School today is proud to be recognized as a dynamic independent law school, promoting excellence in all aspects of legal education.

About the Fair Housing Clinic

As part of its Fair Housing Legal Support Center, The John Marshall Law School operates the Fair Housing Legal Clinic, where students represent clients who have been denied housing because of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, familial status, marital status, age, source of income, sexual orientation, or other protected classes. The Fair Housing Legal Clinic offers students an opportunity to participate in federal and state courts and before administrative agencies. Students may draft pleadings, motions, and appellate briefs, may participate in hearings for temporary restraining orders and preliminary injunctions, may conduct discovery and may assist in trials and hearings.

About the One-Year Clinical Attorney Fellowship Position

The One-Year Clinical Attorney Fellowship Position is an opportunity for a recent graduate of The John Marshall Law School to serve at the Clinic handling cases and teaching clinical law students. The Clinical Attorney will participate in teaching twenty-five to thirty law students who will take the Clinic as a matriculated graded course. The Clinical Attorney, with other Clinic staff, will handle a portion of the Clinic's cases. The Clinical Attorney will be responsible for all aspects of prosecuting and managing the matters to which the Clinical Attorney is assigned. The Clinical Attorney will also participate in office management, education and outreach programs and other Clinic initiatives as directed. The position will give the Fellow experience in fair housing enforcement and practice, including the Testing Program, as well as in office management, and the supervision of students. It will provide attorneys with an important reference and experience that they can use in diverse positions after they completed the fellowship.

Applications will be accepted from graduates of The John Marshall Law School from May 2008 through 2010 who were enrolled in The John Marshall Law School Fair Housing Legal Clinic. Applicants should be admitted (or be eligible for admission) to the bar of the State of Illinois and eligible to be admitted to the Federal Court.

The John Marshall Law School offers a salary consistent with standards for such positions in the area, and excellent benefits.
